ville 5 hewest norse impressive in Blainville

Vince's insley show jumping success goes on - or make that grows on.

The 27-year-old Miltonian recently beefed up her competitive ranks with eight-year-old Dutch Warmblood Uno, who's wasted little time proving himself to be a credible addition to the team.

In only her second World Cup Qualifier Sunday afternoon, the Team Vince newcomer — who joins veteran standout Catch 22 and handsome stallion Kafka delivered a second-place finish in the \$60,000 Grand Prix in Blainville, Que.

Part of a five-entry jump-off, Vince and Uno turned in a second straight clean round, but needed two-and-a-half seconds more to tame the course than Belgium's Eric Flameng and Roxanne.

That narrow span kept Vince from repeating as Blainville's

Grand champion, after prevail-Catch 22 last year. While somewhat disappointed defending her title, the local

show jumper is more than a little encouraged about the strong showing by her newest partner.

"He's been so good, he has been in the jump-off in every class he's entered in this week," noted the two-time Canadian Show Jumping champion. "I wouldn't say I'm that surprised by his performance, but it's always nice when a horse without much experience shows this kind of potential."

Purchased for Vince this past winter in Florida by the KMA Group, Uno also took sixth-place honours in Blainville's Open Jumper — in which teammate Kafka, slowly being brought back

from a spring injury, finished second to Terra Cotta's Chris Pratt and Markant.

While not reaching the Grand Prix jump-off, Catch 22 has had his share of success this season including a July 3 \$75,000 CN Grand Prix victory in Bromont,

These efforts add to Vince's impressive track record in Quebec - one that should continue with an all-important third mount on her

"Having that third horse gives me the depth you need for a long season," she said. "It allows you to rest on the horses now and then and just increases your chances in the big events. And it's nice to have one of the horses (Uno) a little younger than the others to provide that nice complement."

Meanwhile, fellow Miltonian Erynn Ballard also competed in Blainville last week and finished fifth in Saturday's \$20,000 Challenge Desjardins Modified Grand Prix with Rio's Rhapsody.
