Haydar re-signs with Nashville

SPALDING

here's nothing like a hefty pay hike to follow up a championship-rich season.

Such is the case for Darren Haydar, who earlier this month re-signed with the Nashville Predators - and by extension, their AHL affiliate Milwaukee Admirals.

Finalized July 9, the two-way contract calls for the 24-year-old Miltonian to earn \$75,000 US with Milwaukee next season — which represents a third more money than he made last year.


Should the NHL's 2004/05 campaign go ahead and Haydar make the jump to Nashville, his salary would climb to \$450,000.

The deal includes an option for 2005/06, during which the local right winger will either bank \$450,000 or join the free agent market.

"It's definitely a win-win situation that benefits both parties," said Haydar, who fueled Milwaukee's Calder Cup victory drive with a

league-leading 26 playoff points. "If they're not willing to exercise the option two years from now, I'll have the chance to look at any other team."

An offer to play in Germany next season, he noted, likely contributed to a speedy contract with renewal Predators.



Recognizing that this fall may be his greatest opportunity to graduate to Nashville — with the momentum of a successful high-stakes spring with Milwaukee — Haydar admits he has some concern about the potential NHL lockout ahead.

"My value is probably at its peak right now, so it is an issue. But it's not as big a worry for me as for the guys that were actually there (NHL) last year. Regardless of what happens I know I'll be playing next year."

Nashville assistant general Ray Shero said that Haydar is definitely one of the organization's upand-comers that should get a much closer look at this fall.

"He's got so many intangibles and brings a lot to the table, including courage," remarked Shero Wednesday afternoon. "He was a targeted guy throughout the playoffs and often scored or made a play by going into those areas where you don't really want to go. That's courage.

"We'd love to see him make the NHL with Nashville versus somewhere else."

Nevertheless, Haydar has yet to crack the Predators' top five prospects list — at least according to most hockey publications — despite leading Milwaukee in scoring the last two seasons.

But Milton's NHL hopeful isn't preoccupied with rankings or speculation.

Said Haydar, "We'll just have to see how this coming year goes and whether or not I become a piece of their puzzle. If I don't they'll give me the chance to make it somewhere else."


