Defensive lapse proves costly for Senior Sox in quarterfinals

Key clash with old rival spoiled by errors

A familiar foe has denied the Senior Red Sox yet another championship.

Suffering an ill-timed defensive lapse Sunday morning in London, the Red Sox coughed up a late lead and were trimmed 7-6 by host Lakeside in quarterfinal tournament play.

Lakeside, who knocked Milton out of OBA 'B' championship play last summer, capitalized on three errors to deliver the comeback victory.

"We've got to find a way to beat these guys," stressed manager George Moore. "You just can't make mistakes like this against a veteran team."

complete-game effort versus Lakeside, but just didn't have the fielding support he and fellow Red Sox pitchers have enjoyed more often than not this summer.

Moore suggested his team's quarterfinal exit may have had something to do with a 'bit too easy' round-robin campaign, which included back-to-back five-run mercies.

Dependable hurler Ian Zettle gave up just one hit over four innings, while closing things out was Matt Dickson.

The Red Sox jumped out to a commanding 6-0 lead and never looked back, with Jeff MacLeod's homer and double fueling the tournament-opening blowout.

Also standing out with two-hit efforts were Reese Davies and Chris Coughlin.

From there, Milton dumped Essex 10-0, thanks to a strong complete-game showing by Adam Ahearn and a three-run triple by Johnson that put things out of reach in the
