ic opportunity due to people migrating to the Greater Golden Horseshoe.

Several other residents at the meeting echoed these thoughts, suggesting that growth be better spread around the province.

One of the most memorable presentations of the night came from Lana Drmbic-Zappia, a 14year-old Hornby resident, who pleaded that the Province save local farm land.

The local youth even gathered more than 200 signatures on a petition to slow down growth.

"If we keep building roads and houses, there won't be any farms in Halton," she said. "Farms are so important to us. They're the backbone of our existence."

Besides Milton, other areas in Halton that were identified under the growth plan are downtown Burlington (emerging urban centre) and downtown Oakville (priority urban centre).

Ms Evans clarified that the Province doesn't mean for the historical section of Oakville to be

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developed, but the area north of it.

A finalized copy of the provincial document is expected later this year. Some key highlights of the discussion paper are:

· It aims to deliver money for infrastructure only to areas in the Greater Golden Horseshoe region the province deems for growth, thus discouraging developers even further from pursuing rural lands.

The Horseshoe encompasses the area from Niagara, through the GTA out to Simcoe and Peterborough counties.

· Alternative means of transportation are listed as the way of the future, with residents in designated urban centres using transit and highoccupancy vehicle lanes for car pooling.

 An investment in transit systems and vehicle fleets, along with creating an integrated ticketing system that would allow someone to travel seamlessly through the Greater Horseshoe region are initiatives outlined for taking more cars off the road.

 With the goal of concentrating development into one area, the discussion paper suggests people would be able to regularly walk or bicycle to

The final paper will guide land-use planning, urban development, housing, local services, transportation and environmental infrastructure and economic development.

She said the addition will make room for about 245 more students at the new school, which hasn't been named yet.

"It's temporary to accommodate the population bulge," she said, adding that the addition will probably remain at the school for eight to 10 years.

Halton District School Board Chair Mary Chapin said the board is trying to build new schools as quickly as it can to accommodate new students, but it all comes down to a funding formula — all local schools must be filled to 100 per cent capacity before money is generated to open new schools.

"Some of our schools are bursting at the seams, but we're building as fast as the funding formula permits," she said.


