There was no sign of forced entry.

Trailer, refinishing products stolen

A trailer carrying refinishing products was stolen from McGeachie Drive early Saturday morning.

Police report that an area resident witnessed a man pulling away in the \$15,000 Waba trailer — which had roughly \$5,000 worth of materials in back — at about 1 a.m. He followed the vehicle east-bound onto Hwy. 401 but lost him a short time later.

The suspect is described as a short white male between 39 and 45 years of age, with a bald or clean shaven head.

The trailer is described as light blue with a three-inch stripe on the fender and the number 516 painted on the cab.

School vandalized

J.M. Denyes School was targeted by vandals on two separate occasions last weekend.

In one case, unknown suspects smashed the front window and two doors with a stolen speed limit sign. The school was also broken into in another incident, during which a classroom was entered and paint was thrown on the walls. A stereo worth \$150 was also taken from the classroom.

A 48-year-old Milton man faces a dangerous driving charge in connection with an incident in the Mattamy Homes subdivision last Friday evening.

Police responded to a report of a car being driven erratically in the area of Derry and Trudeau roads around 7:30 p.m. When stopped by police, the driver inadvertently reversed the vehicle, causing the officer to jump out of the way.

The suspect will appear in Burlington court October 26.
