The volunteers joined the Halton Hills and Milton fire services, Halton EMS, the York, Toronto and Peel police services, the CN police and the Caledon OPP, plus police canine teams from Halton and Hamilton.

The search went on to the wee hours of the morning yesterday and fortunately had a happy ending as the obviously-exhausted little girl was found sleeping under a tree.

It just goes to show that when the going gets tough, our community is strong. This effort actually defines community, and it confirms what we already knew — that our community is one to be proud of.


