Halton police and Region hear concerns of rural residents during meeting at Kelso

Clear communication coupled with action is what's required to deal with rural residents' concerns.

That was the message presented at Thursday night's Rural Community Forum, in which about 60 residents packed a room at the Halton Region Museum to voice their concerns and talk about solu-

tions.

The main topics of discussion were communication, safety and security, speeding and illegal parking, plus traffic and road maintenance.

Regional Chair Joyce Savoline said she got the idea for the forum while campaigning for the last municipal election.

"What stuck out most were the questions we don't normally have a chance to talk to

the public about," she told the audience.

Ms Savoline hosted the forum with Halton Police Chief Ean Algar, who spoke of the need for a partnership between police and the public — the first step being communication.

"We recognize we're doing a number of things well, but you've got issues and concerns," he began by saying, adding that although Halton is one of the safest communities in Canada, there's still work to be

Rural residents have special safety concerns simply because of the distance between houses, Ms Savoline pointed out, so communication between residents doesn't flow as naturally as it might in Milton's urban parts.

A number of people at the meeting pointed out a way they've found to be very effective in working together on rural issues — community consultation committees, or CCCs.

There are four CCCs in the rural areas surrounding Milton that cover Nelson, Halton Hills, Nassagaweya and Derry.

Staff Sgt. Susan Delaney said CCCs are useful because they're led by residents who know what the problems in their areas are.

"That's the beauty of CCCs — it's your committee," Staff Sgt. Delaney said, adding, "It's important to get involved. We (police) only assist. You can be our second set of eyes."

The Nassagaweya CCC, which has about 18 members, meets the third Monday of each month at 10 a.m. at Nassagaweya Community Centre.

Residents say police response slow

Another issue raised several times by residents was a less-than-speedy police response to their homes when incidents arose.

Chief Algar said although they do their best, calls to police have to be prioritized according to importance. However, if an incident doesn't receive appropriate attention, Chief Algar said he wants to hear about it.

Ms Savoline commented on the dedication of police despite imperfections.

"We don't have a police service that's sitting on their hands and waiting for another break to have a Timbit," she said.

Ward 3 Councillor Cindy Lunau said residents can't depend on police to do everything for them.

"Too often we expect police to solve all our problems. If we expect them (to do everything) we better be prepared to pay for one officer per house 24/7," she said.

A better solution is to work together with police through CCCs and by having neighbours looking out for each other, she said.

When the issue of roads was raised, a number of residents brought up specific intersections they felt warranted traffic lights. One woman brought up the issue of cars speeding on roads where people ride their horses.

A Campbellville resident said noisy, speeding motorcycles is his main concern.

Of course, break-ins are a constant problem. But Halton Regional Police Superintendent Mike Kingston said residents have done a good job helping police make arrests.

"Our break and enter rate is really low," he said. "We solve them because of help from the community."

Ms Savoline concluded the evening on a positive note.

"I hope you agree with me that even though we're not perfect, this is still the best place to be in Ontario. The thing is to get involved — stay aware, stay connected to the community. This is the beginning to be able to discuss how to make the community safer."
