'Hawks turn back Buffalo

Rookie enjoying strong start with hometown club

Finally, a homegrown success story.

For the most part, Milton's Jr. A faithful have been deprived of this since defensive stalwart John Nadalin wrapped up a championship-rich tenure in 2001.

Enter rookie Matt Price — who barring any unforeseen circumstances will be the first native Miltonian in three years to play an entire season for the local juniors. However, that's likely to be the least of his accomplishments during a 2004/05 campaign that's already got fans and opponents alike sitting up and taking notice.

"He's exceeded my expectations of him and right now is a clear cut favourite for Rookie-of-the-Year in the West," said IceHawks assistant general manager Kevin Lachance, who's been high on Price since his bantam days.

ing leader Shandor Alphonso, "Matt's been doing great — really making an impact early. I don't think you could ask for much more out of him."

That last remark refers largely to a pointa-game pace that continued with a goal and an assist in Monday's 6-1 victory over Buffalo.

Currently second in team scoring with six goals and 13 helpers in 18 games — and sitting at an equally-impressive +11 — Price has been about as consistent as any Western Conference 16-year-old in recent memory, with his longest offensive drought lasting a mere two games.

"Scoring those two goals in the home opener was a big boost," said the NCAA Division 1-bound centre, who's exceptionally quick and reads the play as well as any hometown forward since Jr. A star turned NHL hopeful Darren Haydar. "It always helps to get it done right off the bat."

And having other highly-gifted freshman

forwards as teammates this season hasn't hurt either.

He noted, "I think there's some healthy competition among us. We push each other."

What's particularly encouraging about Price is that a good chunk of his production has come against the West's 'Big Three'. He counted two assists — including a nifty set-up on Jason Dopaco's overtime winner

— in a huge 4-3 decision over Georgetown September 24, and notched a potential third-period winner in a heartbreaking 6-4 loss to Oakville October 17.

"Matt's relentless and has really shown up in the

big games. Some of the veterans can learn from him," remarked head coach/general manager George Dupont.

Although Price has been impressing his new coaching staff since day one, a weekend of back-to-back overtime victories late last month spoke

volumes about their faith in him.

The former Oakville Rangers AAA star saw two shifts in both sudden death decisions and has been out for plenty of key situations ever since. "That was kind of an eye opener. You don't always get a lot of feedback from coaches, but that kind of showed the confidence they've got in me. It felt pretty good."

Noted Lachance, "With Matt's speed he's really suited to the four-on-four play of overtime, and with his early-season production it's really not that surprising George would trust him out there in those crucial situations."

Already being courted by several top Division 1 schools for 2006/07 play, the 11th grader is visiting Boston College today and will check out the University of Michigan next weekend. He expects to have a decision made on his post-secondary schooling within the next month or so.
