# GO Transit upgrades coming

The GO Transit rail system through Halton will soon see some major improvements, including a few at the Milton station.

Bob Nairn, program director with the GO Transit Rail Infrastructure Program (GO TRIP), presented details of the plans to regional council last week.

The Milton station is slated for upgrades to accommodate a 12-car train and provide disabled access. Planning is already underway for this part of the project.

Also, the Campbellville layover

facility will be relocated to lands just east of the Milton station. Ground is expected to break in the spring for the new facility that will accommodate an eight to 12-car train.

Elsewhere in Halton, a third track is in the works for the Lakeshore West corridor from Port Credit to Oakville.


"An environmental assessment is underway and should be done in the spring," Mr. Nairn said.

He added that the extra track will provide additional commuter rail

capacity and resolve operational constraints.

A third track from Burlington junction to Bayview junction is also on the horizon, with construction possibly starting next year.

The main objectives of the GO TRIP program are to support growth in the GTA and surrounding regions, enhance customer service and the environment and support the new provincial growth guidelines.

# City of Guelph Water Supply Master Plan Class Environmental Assessment

### Background

In 1999, the City of Guelph initiated a Water Supply Strategy project to address the supply of municipal water to meet future projected demands. Based on comparisons of demand to capacity, the project concluded that there is a need to supplement the existing municipal water supply system, both immediately and in the long term. In response to this the City has implemented a comprehensive water conservation/demand management program as well as a program to potentially increase capacity from the existing Arkell Spring Grounds municipal well system.

### Master Plan Project Now Underway

Looking towards the longer term, the City has initiated a Water Supply Master Plan Project. The Master Plan Project will identify additional sources of water to supplement the existing supply in the 50+ year planning horizon (i.e. to at least 2054). Alternatives to be studied include developing additional groundwater supplies as well as developing alternative municipal supplies which could include new surface water sources and partnerships with neighbouring municipalities. This project is being developed as a Municipal Class Environmental Assessment (Class EA) under Ontario's Environmental Assessment Act.

### Public Involvement Welcome

Public involvement is an important part of the Class EA process. Residents, businesses and community organizations are invited to participate in developing the new Water Supply Master Plan that is expected to be completed by mid 2005. Opportunities for public input, including public meetings, workshops and open houses, will occur throughout the Master Plan process to seek community feedback on identified additional sources of water for the City. Future consultation events will be publicized in this newspaper, through direct mail, and posted on the City's website at www.guelph.ca. Other consultation activities include formation of a Water Supply Master Plan Public Advisory Committee (PAC) with broad representation from stakeholders which will provide support and advice to the Master Plan Project Team.
