## Reid back from shoulder injury

67s' defenceman showing strongly since recent return

Elgin Reid has a huge weight off his shoulders — well, at least one of them.

Although working out and traveling with the Ottawa 67s kept him focused and relatively positive, Milton's lone OHLer couldn't completely fight back the frustration while a separated right shoulder sidelined him through most of the first half of 2004/05.

Fortunately, that seems to be behind him. While still awaiting results of last month's MRI, the 17-year-old defenceman returned to the lineup December 28 against Oshawa — helping the 67s prevail 4-1 — and has played all six games since.

And the pain suffered during a brief, ill-conceived comeback in October has yet to resurface.

"You have no idea how great it is to be back," said the rugged second-year blueliner, who missed part of last season with an injured left shoulder. "It's such a great feel-

ing to be playing again."

Reid hasn't just suited up since the holiday break, but thrived as well — with some stabilizing play in his own end and five points in the last four games.

Among those was his first Major-Junior goal, which came during second-period play in Friday's 3-2 win over Erie. "It was a three-on-two rush. I took a pass from Jakub Petruzalek and just went five-hole. I don't know how many posts I've hit in the past year-and-ahalf, so it was nice to get the monkey off my back.

"It's not like it's my job to score, but it's great to chip in offensively. I've seen a ton of ice time since being back and think I've done pretty well."

Head coach Brian Kilrea agrees.

"The emergence of Elgin has made our team much better. I like the way we've progressed with him in the lineup."

Ottawa's longtime bench boss added that Reid's return allowed him the opportunity to swing a deal with Sault Ste. Marie to acquire defenceman David Jarram —

who's now billeting with Reid.

The 67s and Greyhounds have actually made two trades in the past month, which Reid feels has bolstered his team's physical presence substantially.

"I wouldn't want to say we had soft guys before, but we're definitely more of a crash and bang team now," he said.

Reid tallied three assists in a 6-6 tie with Oshawa January 2, and has been a +5 with two points in three games since then — most recently finishing a +3 in Sunday's 5-2 home-ice victory over

Toronto.

"Things are going great," said the sophomore defenceman.

Now 18-16-5-1, the 67s have an opportunity to take over sole possession of second place in the East Division tomorrow evening with a road trip to Belleville.

Area fans can see Reid compete close to home later this month, when he and Ottawa visit Brampton January 30 for a 2 p.m. start against the Central Division-leading Battalion.

The meeting is open to anyone and will include 2005 initiatives and other general topics of interest.

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
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# Cross-border basketball clash in area this weekend
