## EC wrestlers dominate

E.C. Drury's wrestling team kicked off 2005 in fine form, with medal-rich hauls at two different meets last weekend.

The Spartans began at last Friday's Thorold Tournament — with all four representatives securing a top-three finish.

Leading the way with his second gold of the year was Bryan Morgan, who went 3-0 with two come-from-behind victories to clinch top honours.

Chris Flannigan struck silver
— his second for 2004/05 —

while Peter Leaman and Alan Moffat both came away with bronze, each bowing out to the eventual champions in semifinal combat.

In Hagersville Saturday, Drury amassed seven golds and 10 medals overall plus the open division team title at the Central-Western Ontario Regional Championships.

Topping their respective open division weight classes were Leaman, Moffat, Gary Ferrier and Kyle Shermet, while Kevin Iwasa-Madge, Jared Robb and Nick Ronan prevailed within the cadet ranks.

All seven earned advancement to the amateur provincials at the University of Guelph February 5 and 6.

Leaman's triumph gives him a team-leading four golds. His seven medals ties him for first among the Spartans with Carl Chan — who placed second in Hagersville and is the first Drury wrestler

this season to crack the 30-win plateau.

Shermet now has half-a-dozen medals, while Robb leads the local rookie contingent with five.

Morgan and freshman Blake Elliot rounded out the medal haul with silver and bronze respectively.

## Bertoli stepping it up offensively

Scott Bertoli's second-half scoring prowess continues.

Since joining the ECHL's Trenton Titans five-and-a-half years ago, the 27-year-old Miltonian has had a knack for picking things up offensively through the later stages of the season — a trend which has evidently carried over into his current campaign.

The well-rounded left winger has a dozen points in his last nine games, including seven in the last four. "I don't know what it is, but I seem to have slow starts and then come on in the second half," said Bertoli Tuesday afternoon from his New Jersey-based residence. "I'm not sure just why that is."

He delivered a season-high four points in last Friday's 5-2 victory over the

Johnstown Chiefs, posting his first hat-trick since the 2001/02 season in the process.

Bertoli drew an assist and powerplay marker in the opening frame and followed that up with goals on back-to-back shifts in the third period to put the game away.

He recalled, "The last two (goals) came right on top of each other — both off the draw. Bryce (Cockburn) got it back to me cleanly each time and I went five hole and top shelf."

Bertoli would be held off the scoresheet the next night in a big 2-0 win over fellow front-runner Atlantic City, but sank his 12th season deposit Sunday afternoon in a 3-1 setback to Bakersfield.

Overall, he now sits tied with Rick Kowalsky for the team scoring lead with 27 points in 29 games and has a strong chance of recording his sixth straight 50-plus point campaign. He also has a legitimate shot at breaking his single-season scoring record of 25 goals — established during 2001/02 play, in which he amassed a personal high 71 points.

Now 17-7-4, the Titans remain in excellent position to finish atop both the conference and league. They begin a fivegame road trip that'll take them through the all-star break tonight in Peoria.
