

Tractor worth more than \$100,000 stolen from lot

The tractor of a tractor trailer unit parked at a Lawson Road truck lot was stolen Sunday.

Police said unknown suspects stole the 2005 white Volvo tractor — which has 'Road Star Carrier' written in burgundy on both doors — between 2 a.m. and noon.

The estimated value of the tractor is \$115,000.

Trailer and hardwood stolen

A trailer containing \$36,000 worth of hardwood flooring was stolen from a Lawson Road truck company between Saturday and Monday.

Police said unknown suspects stole the 2004 white utility trailer valued at \$50,000 from Blueline Transport where it was parked. The trailer contained 24 skids of cherry wood and maple wood hardwood flooring and installation kits.

Kiosk broken into

The Gateway News kiosk at Milton Mall was broken into overnight Saturday.

Police said unknown suspects gained access to the locked kiosk and stole cigarettes and an undisclosed quantity of cash.

School broken into

Cash was stolen from the principal's office at E.W. Foster School on Coxé Boulevard during a recent break-in.

The unknown suspects also attempted to pry open a filing cabinet in a room next to the principal's office during the incident, which happened overnight February 7.

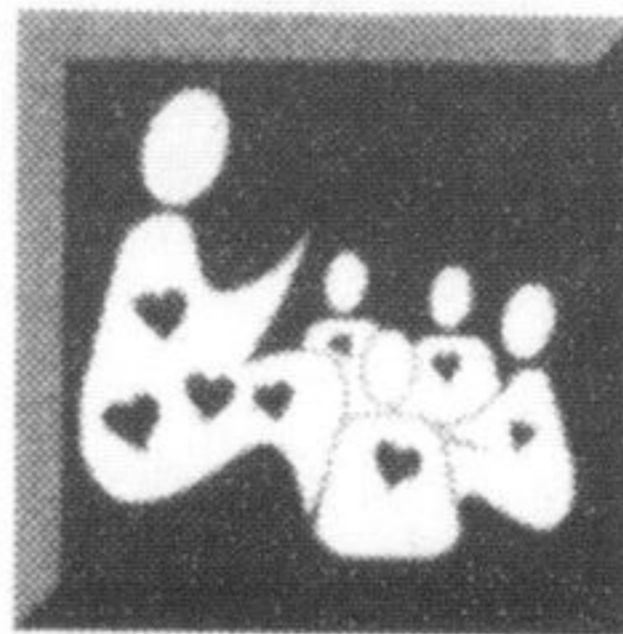
Air compressor stolen from home
