


The Milton Downtown Business Improvement Area is in the process of developing a slogan that truly typifies the experience of being in the heart of Downtown Milton.

Bike path redesign report presented at committee

It looks like Milton may never see another proposal for a paved bike path that would cut across boulevards and driveways on collector roads.

A report presented to the community services committee Monday night detailed staff's proposal to change the Town's design of 26-metre wide collector roads to include a bike lane on the road portion, not the boulevard.

"The redesign has been vetted through the trails advisory committee and will be presented to the builders/developers liaison committee at their next meeting," the staff report said.

Boulevard bike paths became a

hot topic around Milton about two years ago when residents in Mattamy's east-end Hawthorne subdivision discovered there were plans to retrofit this type of path into their neighbourhood.

Many people said they were never told by the developer about the path before buying their homes. Also, concerns of safety, property values and boulevard parking factored into the debate.

Council then decided to delete the controversial path and redirect funds that would've been used to build it to trail improvements in other areas of the Bristol Survey, such as lighting for the planned multi-use trail that will follow a Union Gas corridor in the south end.

Mattamy has put forward its support for this proposed change.

The staff report notes that the boulevard bike paths planned for collector roads in other Bristol Survey subdivisions are subject to deletion given the new collector road proposed design.

"Staff are proposing that bike path funds from these other subdivisions should also be utilized in the Union Gas trail project," the report said.


The report will come before Milton council February 28.
