NOTICE OF PUBLIC MEETING PROPOSED HOUSEKEEPING AMENDMENTS TO COMPREHENSIVE ZONING BY-LAW 144-2003 RELATING TO VETERINARY CLINICS AND VETERINARY HOSPITALS

Please be advised that the Corporation of the Town of Milton will be holding a statutory public meeting pursuant to Section 34 of the Planning Act RSO 1990 as amended, on:

to receive input from the public regarding housekeeping amendments to Comprehensive Zoning By-law 144-2003 proposed by the Planning & Development Department in relation to veterinary clinics and veterinary hospitals in the urban and rural/agricultural areas of the Town of Milton.

The proposed amendments will affect all lands within the Town of Milton regulated by Zoning By-law 144-2003. For this reason, no map has been attached.

The purpose and effect of the amendments is outlined below:

To revise the following:

- the definitions of "Veterinary Clinic" and "Veterinary Hospital" to be "Veterinary Clinic- Small Animal", "Veterinary Clinic- Large Animal", "Veterinary Hospital Small Animal", and "Veterinary Hospital-Large Animal"
- · the definition of "Boarding Kennel" to contain the revised terminology
- · two site-specific provisions (i.e. M2*27 and C6*43) to contain the revised terminology

to allow the following:

- "Veterinary Clinic Small Animal" in the zones where veterinary clinics are currently permitted (i.e. in various commercial zones including Hamlet Commercial, employment, business park and industrial zones);
- "Veterinary Hospital Small Animal" in the zones where veterinary hospitals are currently permitted (i.e. in the employment, business park and industrial zones);
- "Veterinary Clinic Large Animal", supporting a mobile large animal practice, in the zones where veterinary clinics are currently permitted (i.e. in various commercial zones including Hamlet Commercial, employment, business park and industrial zones) as well as the rural and agricultural areas;
- · "Veterinary Hospital- Large Animal", in the rural and agricultural areas only.

ANY PERSON MAY attend the Public Meeting to obtain information and make a verbal presentation and/or written submission, to identify issues of concern and/or express views in support of, or in opposition to, the proposed amendments.

The Public Meeting is an information meeting and staff will not be making a recommendation on whether to approve or refuse the proposed amendments at this Public Meeting. It is anticipated that a staff recommendation with respect to the proposed amendments outlined above will be made at a future date when the Town's Planning and Development Department has completed a full review of the proposed amendments and the results of the public meeting. At that time, Planning Staff will bring a report with recommendations forward for consideration and decision.

Persons who sign the register at the Public Meeting, or who file a written request for notification with the Town of Milton Planning and Development Department, will be notified when the matter is to come before Council for final consideration.

Please note that the Ontario Municipal Board may dismiss all or part of the appeal, if a person or public body that files an appeal of a decision of the Town of Milton in respect of a proposed application under the Planning Act, does not make an oral submission at the public meeting or written submission to the Town of Milton before a decision is made and the proposed by-law is adopted.

Copies of the proposed housekeeping amendments to the Comprehensive Zoning By-law relating to veterinary clinics and veterinary hospitals will be attached as part of an information report for the March 21, 2005 public meeting. A copy of the staff report and amending by-law will be available on Thursday afternoon, immediately prior to the Public Meeting. "Brian is familiar with the workings of all the committees at Conservation Halton," Mr. Krantz said.

Appointees on the board — which includes both councillors and citizen appointees — are selected by their municipal council.

Burlington councillor Carol D'Amelio was also nominated for the position of chair.

Jean Williams, a citizen appointee from Mississauga and former CH chair for four years, chose not to seek re-election, but will continue serving on the board as she's done for 20 years.

"I do not intend to ride off into the sunset, never to be heard from again. I intend to demonstrate that old chairs just keep rocking in another part of the room," Ms Williams said after a presentation outlining CH's achievements last year.

Mr. Penman thanked Ms Williams for her dedication to the board. "She genuinely puts her heart and soul into every moment of this organization."

Ms Williams nominated Burlington citizen appointee John Vice for vice-chair, and he was later acclaimed.

Ms Williams spoke of his recent efforts on the organization's financial review committee, and said although he's been a member of the board for just a year, he's shown true dedication.

"I feel he'd contribute to the skill set of the new chair extremely well," she said.

Mr. Vice said he'd be honoured to serve as vice-chair.

"I pledge to you my hard work and probably a few mistakes," he told the board. "I'll concentrate on the job at hand and (contribute) as sincerely and professionally as I can."

The meeting included a moment of silence in memory of board member Stephen Peebles who passed away earlier this month. Mr. Peebles represented Puslinch.

A Brampton man charged with attempted murder in connection with the shooting of a Milton resident will return to Burlington court March 23 to be spoken to.
