# Do-or-die time for 'Hawks after straight losses

#### Milton hoping to stave off elimination tonight at Memorial

The IceHawks couldn't wait to leave Gordon Alcott Arena Saturday night, but would like nothing more than to make a return trip there tomorrow evening.

Down three-games-to-two after a losing weekend that was capped with a heartbreaking 4-3 defeat in double overtime, Milton now needs a do-or-die victory tonight at home to get back to Georgetown's barn for a winner-takes-all seventh clash.

But staving off elimination even once — much less twice — will require much tighter defensive effort than what was offered during games four and five.

Beginning to show signs of fatigue and significant cracks in their armour, the IceHawks' five blue-

liners turned the puck over far too often in their own end this past weekend.

One of those give-aways allowed Raider Matt Sweazey to bury a straight-away snapshot about eight minutes into the second sudden death frame at a jam-packed Alcott Saturday.

Tom Fenton stopped seven other overtime chances — including a rising blast by Kevin Harvey that was gloved in absolutely dynamite fashion — and made exactly 50 saves overall to effectively distance himself from a rather mediocre performance the night before.

Milton showed a fair amount of jump at the other end of the ice and forced overtime with an equalizer by young call-up John Tavares. Setting him up were Chris Bain and Jason Dopaco, who along with captain Shandor Alphonso finished the weekend with three points apiece.

Sweazey and John Wheaton led for Georgetown, combining for 11 points in the back-to-back wins — including eight in game five.

A 1-for-10 powerplay campaign and a few botched breakouts proved disastrous at Memorial Arena Friday.

The IceHawks gave up the first goal of the night while enjoying a two-man advantage and never really shifted out of neutral getting brushed aside 7-3. Back from an undisclosed illness for the first time since the middle of round one, Georgetown starter John Barrow was relatively steady between the pipes, but wasn't severely tested in his much-anticipated comeback.


Fenton's penchant for going down a little early allowed the

Raiders to finally open the floodgates — with the bulk of their scoring done on upstairs shots - while Alphonso, Dopaco and Brett Robinson buried the biscuit for Milton.

The Milton-Georgetown winner will move on to face the Oakville Blades, who eliminated Hamilton with a 4-0 whitewash Friday evening to reach the conference finals.

## Vince, Catch 22 shine in Florida

Finish second in \$25,000 Ariat Challenge Cup Thursday

Milton's Ainsley Vince shone under a heavy downpour Thursday night in the \$25,000 Ariat Challenge Cup at the Winter Equestrian Festival in Wellington, Florida.

The 28-year-old show jumping ace and longtime partner Catch 22 finished second among a field of 60 competitors, advancing to a 10-entry jump-off and completing it just a little behind final challenger Kent Farrington with another flawless round.

"It was raining so hard I could barely see," recalled the two-time Canadian Show Jumping champion. "I

really didn't plan to go so fast, I thought I would end up fourth or fifth, but Catch 22 felt super. He has days when he's on and that is all there is to it, and it was one of those days."

Vince also showed strongly with Uno Thursday. The pair delivered an eighth-place finish with four faults in the jump-off in the \$7,500 1.45m competition that included 71 entries.

Vince and kid sisters Courtney, 25, and Sydney, 22, are based in Florida for the winter and continue competing at the Wellington festival this week.
