## Petro Canada gas station broken into


Halton Regional Police are investigating a break-in at the Petro Canada gas and was wearing a winter ski jacket with to an arrest in this or any other matter, station in Milton.

#### Colorectal Cancer: What You Need to Know

A free public education seminar presented by Halton Healthcare as part of their "Living Healthy" series

Individuals interested in colorectal cancer are invited to attend a free health seminar entitled "Colorectal Cancer: What You Need to Know" to take place on Tuesday, March 22 at 7:00 p.m. at the Milton District Hospital Classroom. The seminar is being presented in partnership with Halton Healthcare Services - Milton District Hospital site, the Colorectal Cancer Association of Canada and the Canadian Cancer Society. It is made possible due to a nonrestricted educational grant from Ferring Pharmaceuticals with appreciation to Milton District Hospital Foundation. ASL interpretive services are available for the hearing impaired through sponsorship of Siemens Hearing Instruments and Unitron Hearing Canada.

Colorectal cancer is the second leading cause of cancer death in Canada. More than 19,000 new cases are diagnosed each year. Despite its high incidence, colorectal cancer is one of the most detectable, and, if found early, most treatable forms of cancer. Advancing age, diet, personal history of polyps and bowel disease, hereditary factors and family history are some of the risk factors for developing colorectal cancer.

Colorectal cancer, like other cancers, responds best to treatment when it is found and treated as early as possible. Treatment is most effective before the disease spreads outside of the colon. Colorectal cancer screening is advised as part of routine medical care when there are no symptoms present. The Canadian Cancer Society recommends that all men and women talk with their doctors about colorectal screening.

Drs. Jeff Kolbasnik, General Surgeon (Milton District Hospital) in his presentation "Colon Cancer: a Treatable and Preventable Disease" will provide information on the prevalence, early detection, diagnosis, and treatment of colorectal cancer. Dr. Steve Gallinger, Professor of Surgery (University of Toronto) and Co-Director for Cancer Genetics Centre (Samuel Lunenfeld Research Institute) will present "Advances in Colorectal Cancer Research". In addition there will be lots of time for participants to have their questions answered.

This free seminar will be held on Tuesday, March 22nd at the Milton District Hospital, which is located at 30 Derry Road East.
