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## Big Brothers of Halton, Big Sisters of Oakville merge

Big Brothers of Halton and Big Sisters of Oakville have officially merged, creating a vibrant new agency for which the children continue to come first, says the organization.

Big Brothers Big Sisters of Halton, as the joint venture is now called, came into being February 22 when members of both organizations approved the amalgamation. The meetings were followed by a joint celebration.

Former Big Sisters Executive Director Elaine Collins has accepted the position of executive director of the new agency. Ms Collins has an MBA and came from a successful background of personal commercial banking prior to joining the Big Sister team almost three years ago.

Ms Collins said she's looking forward to the challenge that lies with unifying two agencies into

"It is really about doing what's best for the at-risk children of this

community," she said. "We will be able to share our strengths, expertise and community relationships for the benefit of both girls and boys."

The United Way of Oakville, a major source of funding for both organizations, has been supportive throughout the merger process. The agencies were also assisted by the law firm O'Connor McLeod Hanna, which donated time preparing the necessary legal documenta-

Big Brothers of Halton was founded in 1965 followed by Big Sisters of Oakville in 1968. The national body of Big Brothers and Big Sisters unified in 2000 with such positive results that many regional chapters followed suit, and by 2004 only eight communities nationally hadn't merged. Locally, directors from both boards began a dialogue more than a year ago to explore ways to forge a closer partnership.

The new agency will provide

increased efficiencies, allow for better promotion and expand services free of issues associated with gender.

Working out of the Morden Road office formerly occupied by only Big Brothers, staff members - who are accustomed to running operations on extremely tight budgets will save more money through such pragmatic measures as combining telephone systems, photocopying and even a postal meter. Mileage can also be reduced since staffers can stop duplicating visits, one to see a little boy, another for a

From the public's point of view, people will no longer have to split their financial donations based on gender, making fundraising less of a struggle.


Professional blacksmith and museum consultant Darrell Markewitz will present an overview of the his-
