Also cracking the top 10 were 11year-old Colm Whitford and 12-yearold Brent Burke. Whitford swam the 200m backstroke to fifth-place honours and rounded out his campaign with a seventh in the 100m backstroke and

eighth in the 400m freestyle, while Burke enjoyed identical sixth-place showings in the 100 and 200m breaststroke.

Rounding out the Marlins' contingent were Larissa Ruiz, Rachel Robinson, Catherine Boyd and James Bramley.
