Aided by a Miltonbased foursome, the minor atom Hurricanes claimed bronze at Teen Ranch Sunday - shading the York-Simcoe Express 3-2 Sunday.

Goalie Jason da Silva was between the pipes for the narrow win and turned back a number of key scoring chances, including a couple of breakaways.

His rock-solid cage work was supported by local defencemen Bryce Abraham and Ryan Stark — who provided some exceptional coverage and huge hits to preserve the victory, which served as revenge for a 7-5 loss to York-Simcoe in round one.

DaSilva was also in net for the defending champion Hurricanes' lone round-robin win — a 5-4 decision over the Whitby Warriors. "They're all impact players," said coach Rob Adams of his Milton youngsters.

Halton's bronze-medal win represented part one of a pay-back double-header Sunday, as the Welland Tigers went on to avenge an earlier loss to the Hamilton Jr. Bulldogs with a 3-1 triumph in the gold-medal showdown.

IceHawks owner and president Mario Forgione told The Champion Wednesday morning that an offer to buy the team has fallen through.


"It just didn't meet our criteria," he said, not offering further details on what specifically nixed the sale.

Leaving no room for doubt as to who the better team was with the title on the line, the Madd Dawgs brushed aside Ajax 74-45 to kickstart a thoroughly hectic spring schedule in triumphant fashion.

A 27-2 second quarter was essentially the difference.


