Transportation in Milton, Mr. Morley, 57, of Halton Hills often takes one of his employer's rigs to the school or parking lot, to allow people to see what life is like up in the cab of a Freightliner.

"They find it's another world," he said. "The tractor-trailer truck might be a familiar sight on the road, yet few ever sit behind the wheel and see it from our perspective."

In 16 years, Mr. Morley has seen significant changes in the world of trucking, with the addition of tracking systems on trailers and cabs so the company knows exactly where the vehicle is at any given minute, and mechanical innovations in the trucks themselves.

His new Freightliner is equipped with a 10-speed automatic transmission, which would have been unheard of a few years ago.

Mr. Morley said being a good truck driver is more than just stepping behind the wheel. A driver must be able to drive a truck (obviously) but also navigate through numerous maps, know the rules of the road, be aware of the truck's safety and be able to recognize truck problems when he breaks down so that he can tell his dispatcher (or service man) exactly what is wrong with the truck.

Being a Road Knight is a life-long distinction, but Mr. Morley and his colleagues are only active for two years, volunteering and talking to groups.

Mr. Morley is reimbursed for travel expenses by his employer, who actually encouraged him to apply for the position.

Having a Road Knight driving one of your trucks is considered quite an honour by the trucking business world.
