



"Elvis really stepped it up on day two and gave a great performance," remarked elated instructor Sifu Glen Doyle, who's been chosen to coach Canada's world qualifying contingent.

Added Stojko, "The key I think was the power and extension in my routine. A lot of guys when they're nervous tend to do smaller moves, but kung fu forms really look like fighting, so you have to be crisp and quick — no holding back."

The Canadian champion stressed that he had to elevate his efforts to stay ahead of Borja in the run-off.

"Richard was really strong on Sunday, and I think that gave me a little awakening. I fed off his success and ran with it."

Stojko also advanced in weapons placing fourth with his double daggers in a group of nine competitors. He was seated fifth after the first day, which would have been enough to qualify. However, much like with open hand forms, he lifted his game and managed to move up a spot.

"I'm really excited to be going to worlds in a different sport," he said.
