Province suffering from real shortage of teachers

'Time Capsules' are gems of information extracted from past issues of The Champion and other publications in order to provide a window into Milton's past. Explanatory comment is sometimes provided to place the situation in context.

August 1905

A scarcity of public school teachers is reported throughout Ontario. The explanation is low salaries and high living expense. There are higher financial rewards in other professions. There is no encouragement to the brainy man or woman to adopt the teaching profession and the present situation will not improve until there is a general increase in salaries.

One of the two small bridges on the base line (Steeles Ave.) opposite T.J. Chisholm's farm has been demolished. It gave way beneath Mr. Downs's engine. Ex Warden H.W. Cook inspected it on Saturday on behalf of the road and bridge committee of the county council and said it would be replaced with concrete and iron. In the meantime the road is barricaded and all vehicles have to go through Mr. Chisholm's lane and a field. Another bridge, less than a mile away, on the 5th line of Trafalgar, has been wrecked in the same way by Mr. Stark's engine. It is a township bridge and Trafalgar council will have it repaired or rebuilt.

Geo. Andrew conducted the sale of the residence and furniture of the late George Hume on Saturday. J.W. Elliott bought the residence for Mr. Andrew. The price was \$3,250, a figure which shows that the value of Milton real estate has increased about 50 per cent, within the last two or three years. There is a great demand for good dwellings. There are none to rent.

At a meeting of the congregation of Grace Church, held in the school-house yesterday evening, it was decided unanimously to have a surpliced choir. The matter of providing ways and means was left by resolution to the members of the choir, who will appoint a committee from among themselves to deal with it. The choir men and boys will be provided with cassocks and white surplices. It is expected that the choir will be vested in time for the anniversary services, about Nov. 1st.

and Robert Hilson were killed by a dynamite explosion at the lime works of D. Robertson & Son, on the C.P.R., three miles west of Milton. Ferrier, who had handled dynamite for three or four years, had drilled three holes for blasts. He was in the habit of keeping a small supply of dynamite at the quarry, but in this case he found that it had been exhausted. He went to where the main supply was stored and brought back a fresh lot, no one knows how much, but perhaps ten or fifteen sticks. He carried them in a box, in which there were also some caps and a piece of

He set the box on the ground and began to prepare his three blasts. Hilson, who was employed as a teamster, had just loaded his wagon with stone. He walked over to where Ferrier sat and, stooping over him, began a conversation. The men were about 100 feet away from other workmen. There was an explosion, but no one can say what caused it. Ferrier's body was thrown about 30 feet. Both his legs were broken and mangled and his body was more or less bruised and burnt. When other men reached him he was breathing his last. Both Hilson's legs were broken backwards at the knees. Though he was not as badly mangled as Ferrier, he died in a few minutes. He spoke once and said he was dying. He was about 55 years of age and left a large family, most of whom are grown up. Ferrier's age was about 30. He left a young widow and three small children. Both were steady, hardworking men. Hilson's family asked for an inquest, but Coroner McColl saw no necessity for calling one, as the death of the men was purely accidental and no one but themselves was responsible for
