A 'Truth About Youth' report was published in 2004 making recommendations to help police and youth in the region form and maintain constructive relationships.

The study focuses on the report's recommendations and will develop information to help police and youth form productive and positive relationships.

Recommendations coming out of the study will focus on opportunities to build and maintain those relationships starting with a young person's first contact with police.




