On a more positive note in this terrible crash, we would like to applaud Tara Anderson of Milton, who showed her bravery and good citizenship by helping at the scene.

Not all people would have gotten involved the way she did, and to do so at the young age of 18 speaks to her character.

However the police investigation plays out, never drink and drive.




