Hawks kick off new year in style

Cap first weekend by dismantling lowly Streetsville

arry Batanoff may want to think about hiring an assistant for the next time the IceHawks take on Streetsville.

Because if this past weekend was any

indication, the Milton statistician is going to MILTIN be awfully busy whenever his club does battle with the Derbys — who may wind up blowing their entire Royal Bank Cup budget on scoresheets long before next spring's national championship.

A whopping 50 penalties were assessed at Vic Johnston Memorial Arena Saturday night, when the IceHawks capped their first weekend of regular season play with an 11-1 cakewalk.

Facing minimal resistance from a team thoroughly devoid of discipline or defensive prowess, Milton jumped out to a 5-0 first-period lead and amassed six powerplay goals to improve to 2-0.

Newly-appointed captain Luke Dubbin - an OHL overager who spent the last two seasons with the Sudbury Wolves - said he certainly didn't expect the evening-long parade to the penalty box, but that it did give his IceHawks a chance to work on their special-teams play.

He added, "One thing I was really

impressed with tonight was how every line contributed. If you look at the scoresheet, it's not just three or four guys on there."

That definitely wasn't a hollow sentiment, given that 15 Milton players including goalie Zach Kleiman — factored into the scoring, and nine had multi-point

Defencemen Jeff Caister and Jordan Skinner had a goal and three assists each, while winger Chase Langeraap tallied twice and added a helper.

The IceHawks had 22 powerplays, including half-a-dozen two-man advantages — three of which were scored on.

Derbys didn't bring in many impact players this summer and were knocked off 7-3 by the mediocre-at-best Mississauga Chargers Friday.

Milton's Steve Ellison scored the first Streetsville goal in that game but sat out Saturday with an injured hand.

While he didn't have to come up with anything close to his 'A' game to turn back the all-bark-and-no-bite Derbys, Kleiman was certainly a standout the night before against Brampton.

Cutting down the angles with textbook precision and stopping at least a handful of huge rebounds, the 6'3", 210 lbs. Saskatoon netminder held the fort to critical acclaim until his teammates potted two third-period goals to pull away for a 4-1 home-opening victory.

"Zach's been excellent so far and really bailed us out against Brampton," Dubbin stressed. "He's so solid out there and just finds ways to see the puck."

That last comment referred to Kleiman's composure during extended periods of high traffic pressure from the Capitals Friday — especially during the opening frame, when he stoned the fast-start visitors with 14 straight saves.

Dubbin, Langeraap and Price each had a goal and an assist, with Price netting the winning late in the second on a short-range rebound.

The IceHawks will look to make it two in a row versus the Capitals when they head to Brampton Thursday. From there they return to Memorial Arena Friday to take on Hamilton at 7:30 p.m. Sunday afternoon they host Oakville at 3 p.m.

With O'Shea back, Argos annihilate Ticats

Mike O'Shea couldn't have picked a more memorable game for his return.

Back from a shoulder injury that sidelined him for the Argos' 33-30 Labour Day loss to the Tigercats, Milton's 34-year-old linebacker led a Toronto defense that earned its first shutout victory in more than a quarter of a century with Saturday's 48-0 annihilation of Hamilton.

The monster payback victory — pushing the East Division-leading Boatmen to 7-4

- saw O'Shea and company completely neutralize the Ticats, who crossed midfield just once all game.


