# Hawks intensify efforts to dump South's frontrunner

The IceHawks know that talent alone will only take them so far, and decided to bring a more complete package to Mississauga Saturday morning.

Adding tenacity and teamwork to the mix — many might argue for the first time this season — Milton laid waste to its Governors' Showcase (formerly College Weekend) opposition at Erin Mills

Twin Rinks.

With numerous scouts looking on, the IceHawks overcame a clear size disadvantage with a fierce forecheck and plenty of chemistry to dump the Southern Conferenceleading Markham Waxers 9-2.

The decisive win capped another winning weekend for the IceHawks, who continue to sit atop the West at 6-0-1-1. "We didn't just win on talent today," said hometown sophomore centre Matt Price, who helped fuel the blowout with a goal and two assists. "We gave it our all for this one, showed some grit and won most of the key battles."

A 3-for-5 powerplay campaign and solid cage work by Zach Kleiman factored into the lopsided victory as well. But for the most part it was significant upgrades in terms of both team unity and intensity that allowed the IceHawks to skate away with their second convincing win over Markham in as many prospects weekend encounters.

Milton broke the previously-unbeaten Waxers' backs with a five-goal second period - chasing netminder Trevor O'Neill from the pipes shortly before intermission - and delivered one of its most disciplined outings of the still-young season.

Captain Luke Dubbin led the onslaught with the

team's first hat-trick of the year and added an assist on a goal by Brandon DeFazio. Kevin Morrison matched that point total with a goal and three helpers, while other multi-point games were recorded by Jeff Caister, Dan Falbo, Chase Langeraap and Aaron Lewicki whom Milton picked up early last week.

A grandson of Detroit Red Wings alumnus Daniel Lewicki, the 20-year-old centre last toiled with the

OHL Barrie Colts and looks to be the emotional sparkplug Milton's

offense needs. At Memorial Arena Friday night, the IceHawks delivered a rather mediocre performance

against the Streetsville Derbys whom they'd dismantled 11-1 just 13 days earlier — and needed a last-minute empty netter by Justin Teakle to cement a 4-2 decision.

With veterans Ryan Bernardi and Jason Fortino returning to the blueline — after sitting out for a week with a tooth abscess and rib injury respectively -Milton held its hosts to 18 shots against rookie cager Andrew Loverock.

Fortino had a goal and an assist in his first game back, while Langeraap and Matt Read rounded out the scoring in a game that was largely devoid of any flow due to Streetsville's non-stop parade to the penalty box. Caister and Dubbin each had two assists in the surprisingly-narrow victory, while Miltonian Steve Ellison notched the Derbys' second goal on a nifty cut inside and low wrister.

Currently enjoying their best start under head coach George Dupont, the IceHawks have arguably their easiest week of the season ahead - with just Friday's home game against the basement-dwelling Buffalo Jr. Sabres. Game time, as always, is 7:30 p.m.
