

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

Such feelings are normal, and they usually pass after a short time. This is not the case with depressive illness. Depression becomes an illness, or clinical depression, when the feelings described are severe, last for several weeks, and begin to interfere with one's work and social life. Depressive illness can change the way a person thinks and behaves, and how his/her body functions. Depression is the most treatable of mental illness.

Individuals with depression and their families, and anyone interested in the diagnosis and treatment of depression, are encouraged to attend this seminar. The event will be held at the Southside Community Church in Milton on Thursday, October 27 with displays and refreshments from 6:30 p.m. and the seminar commencing at 7:00 p.m. The Church is located at 2850 Derry Road East, which is west of Bronte Road.
