However, that will now have to wait if it goes to Heritage Oakville for study.

Oakville councillors questioned whether the general public - whose members are believed to value the scenic, rural route that bends and dips and includes the one-lane bridges — was aware of plans to change the roadway.

Councillors also questioned whether there was any means to rebuild the bridges as one-lane bridges.

Mr. Rook, however, advised that heritage advice received to date indicates the bridges are of "interest," but not "significant" in terms of their heritage value.

Mr. Rook advised the stone abutments may be something to

"it's a really important piece of heritage." preserve as a feature of the new landscape.

Also, once upgrading occurs, those professionals involved are mandated to upgrade the roadway and bridges to current legal standards. Those standards call for two-lane bridges.

Mr. Rook told the committee if either municipality chose to rebuild the one-lane bridges, the bridges wouldn't meet legal requirements and any liability that arose would fall to the municipality — and its taxpayers.

Both bridges have the highest deficiency ranking in Milton. Lower Base Line, adjacent to the Sixteen Mile Creek valley, is also a concern. In the last few years, two sections of the roadway have been closed because of slope failures - affecting access for residents, businesses and emergency services.

The road, according to Mr. Rook, also has several areas of ongoing structural failure, inadequate sight distance and shoul-

ing the bridges as one-lane structures was an issue, admitted Mr. Rook. However, the current bridges can't be refurbished to meet required standards and aren't deemed of any heritage value.

"This affects a wide community. Everyone enjoys the coun-

tryside at some time or other," said Mr. Stoate, noting the scenic Lower Base Line attracts cyclists and car clubs.

"This is a beautiful road," said Councillor Renee Sandelowsky, who called for the referral to Heritage Oakville and won unanimous committee support.

Mr. Sandelowsky said new provincial planning rules provide for consideration of significant cultural and heritage landscapes.

The councillor said she would like Heritage Oakville to explore the new rules and any potential impact on the road.

Mr. Rook admitted some municipalities have different standards for scenic roads.

Mr. Sandelowsky said more study was warranted because


A similar bridge at Fourth Line was closed to vehicles, but still accommodates pedestrians and cyclists.


If duplicate bridges were built, however, it would greater impact the creek valley, advised Mr. Rook.


