Drury senior cagers advance to Halton final

E.C. upstages Reding to reach championship

.C. Drury's senior girls basketball team has rediscovered its winning ways — and not a moment too soon.

Reclassified to Halton's AA playdowns after an 0-8 regular season in a tough East Division, the Spartans pulled off back-to-back wins last week against their cross-town rivals to reach today's regional championships.

While sporting just one starter from last year's OFSAA contingent, E.C. put itself in the Halton finals with Thursday's 37-31 decision over the host Bishop Reding Royals — who went 7-1 in the North loop and no doubt had hopes of fol-

lowing that up with a trip to Sheridan College.

However, the Spartans showed a little more composure and assertiveness in the paint to take a first-quarter lead and maintain it for the duration of the semifinal clash.

"I think the experience from last year boosted our veterans and lifted the rest of the team," said head coach Kevin Houldcroft, whose cagers knocked off Milton District 41-32 in the AA quarterfinals last Tuesday.

In for all 32 minutes Thursday, Sarah Fredricks — the lone returning starter from last season — led Drury with 14 points. Meanwhile, power forward Ashley Rutz — back on the court after taking a year off to concentrate on

lacrosse and hockey — delivered a spirited twoway effort and helped keep Reding's offense in check.

"Having Ashley back this year is huge," said Houldcroft. "She's not necessarily a basketball player, but she's incredibly athletic."

Brooke Harper contributed 10 points to the Spartans' winning cause, while Michelle Parcels made three baskets, including one in the final minute that essentially sealed the deal.

With top gunners Caitlin O'Connor and Lindsey Furik effectively shadowed and held to a combined 11 points, Reding just couldn't turn the tide after falling behind early on — despite scoring the only two three-pointers of the afternoon and enjoying three breakaway lay-up baskets from Carissa Henry.

A sub-par showing at the free throw line was also a stumbling block for the Royals, who pulled to within four points of three separate occasions in the second half before finally being vanquished.

The Spartans will now take on Oakville's St. Thomas Aquinas Raiders in today's Halton AA finals, which begin at 4 p.m. at Sheridan College. Aquinas beat E.C. rather handily in both regular-season encounters and have a solid nucleus back from the team that lost to Drury in OFSAA qualifying play last fall.

"This is suppose to be their year and they'll definitely be looking for revenge against us," Houldcroft explained.

If able to engineer an upset win today, the Spartans will host a Peel Region representative Friday afternoon for berth to OFSAA in Prescott next weekend.

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
