
### No return to Grey Cup for O'Shea and Argos

Mike O'Shea had hoped to be packing his bags for Vancouver yesterday, but instead his Argonauts were packing it in for another season.

One game earlier than they would have liked.

Despite home-field advantage and a two-touchdown lead early on, the 35-year-old Milton linebacker and the Boatmen were downed 33-17 by the Montreal Alouettes Sunday afternoon in the East Division final — crushing their bid at defending the Grey Cup out west.

A 13-year veteran of the CFL with no immediate plans for retirement, O'Shea had said Thursday morning the key to turning back the Als was avoiding the long pass. That proved to be a tall task as the game wore on, with Montreal quarterback Anthony Calvillo gradually getting his air strike rolling and throwing for 190 yards overall on 19 completions.

Sunday's loss — which helped set up the third Montreal-Edmonton Grey Cup

clash in four years — had to be especially heartbreaking for the Argos after they built a 14-0 advantage and looked poise to deliver another rout like the one they laid on the Als October 22 in Montreal.

A victory would have given O'Shea a shot at his fourth Grey Cup. In addition to last season, he won back-to-back CFL championships in 1996 and 1997 — also with Toronto.

# Atom Hurricanes golden at Lake Placid tournament

The Hurricane major atoms enjoyed a golden trip to Lake Placid recently, due in no small part to a local foursome.

Campbellville's Bryce Abraham and Miltonians Jason DaSilva, Tyler Ganly and Ryan Stark all played significant roles in their team's Challenge Cup championship victory, which featured five straight wins and a mere eight goals against over that stretch.

The lone Canadian representative in the eightteam AAA division, Halton clinched the title with a 5-2 decision over Massachusetts's Valley Jr. Warriors Elite November 13.

DaSilva was between the pipes for the victory — putting the finishing touches on a memorable weekend, in which he was runner-up in the skills competition's shoot-out — while Ganly contributed offensively with a pair of assists.

Halton kicked off the tournament with a 6-0

whitewash of Massachusetts' Mill City Monsters, with DaSilva standing tall in net, and then turned back challenges from the Chicago Flames (3-1), Massachusetts' NS Red Wings (6-2) and Connecticut's Ridgefield Lions (8-3) on the way to the finals.

DaSilva backstopped the Hurricanes to victory against the Red Wings, while Abraham and Stark each drew an assist in that win.

Abraham also fore-checked well all weekend and Ganly and Stark were part of a defensive unit that severely limited the opposition's chances.

Abraham and Stark were also among a Halton foursome that took top honours in the skills competitions' relay race.

The Hurricanes' Challenge Cup win came on the same ice surface in which Team Canada struck gold at the 1932 Winter Olympics.


The win boosted the AE2 bantams to 5-6-2 prior to last night's game in Fergus. Friday they travel to Hespeler.
