Hello everyone in the Milton Community! I want to tell you about a school trip for 50 of our students at the marshland in the Mountsberg Conservation Centre. The Centre is a Halton community based environmental agency that protects local ecosystems throughout the watershed area. It's also an awesome place for a trip!

Although the weather was lousy (rainy, cold and damp), most students and staff were well prepared with their rain gear...which by the way was completely soaked through after about 2 hours. Oh well! That's part of the adventure of outdoor education!

On the trip the students observed a variety of birds such as the raptor hawk and the great horned owl. These birds of prey were being treated for a number of problems which are constantly being dealt with by the Conservation Centre staff. It's a wonderful experience to come face to face with these magnificent creatures.

The trip leaders also emphasized the importance of knowing and respecting animals' natural habitats. Humans and wildlife need to share our environment: space, air, water and food.

In addition to the outdoor experiences, students also got to browse in the gallery and gift shop, and see a video presentation on birds.

In addition to the trip to Mountsberg we have been very busy over the past few weeks. We have had three very powerful presentations in the auditorium. The first, on Nov. 9th was a full school assembly in honour of Remembrance Day. The drama class put on a play called, "A Soldier Remembers", we had a slide show, the signing of "O Canada" in ASL sign language, two poems and a personal story shared by a guest speaker. We all took the time to remember and thank those who were part of the war for making Canada a free country.

The second assembly was about Tobacco and Smoking. The speaker, Georgian Lowell was trying to encourage students to quit smoking or to avoid starting. She had a very informative presentation which gave us some important facts about the effects of tobacco and second hand smoke. She also shared some stories from people who have suffered due to the use of tobacco. Many students left the auditorium with lots to think about.

The most recent assembly was about bullying; it was part of the efforts to recognize anti-bullying week from Nov. 14th-20th. Students and staff watched a drama presentation, heard personal stories from some students and watched a student produced drama called "Angel". Many people left with tears in their eyes and a new understanding of how we can all help to stop bullying.

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
