Milton Mom desperate for return of disabled son's hockey gear By STEPHANIE THIESSEN

It's less than two weeks until Christmas, and Joyce Sanderson is feeling anything but in a holiday mood.

At a time when people often do a little more to help their fellow man, Ms Sanderson is wondering what kind of person would steal something that meant so much to her 13-year-old disabled son — his hockey equipment.

And she's pleading with whoever took the equipment to anonymously return it. Hopefully, once that person learns the story behind the equipment, his or her heart will soften, she said.

"Right now, I'm just so distraught," she added.

On Saturday, Ms Sanderson took her son, Gregory, to his ice hockey game, as usual.

The games are always a bright spot for her son, who suffers from a developmental learning disability called Fragile X Syndrome as well as Autism Spectrum Disorder, Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder and Progressive Developmental Delay.

The boy rushed inside like usual, as getting from the car to his Ontario Street apartment causes him great anxiety. His hockey bag was wet, so his mom told him to leave it in the hall until he got settled inside.

But then she forgot it. When she realized her mistake and went to get the bag several hours later, it was gone. Inside the bag was about \$600 worth of hockey

equipment including his skates, jerseys, various protective pads, a throat protector, a helmet, a pair of new hockey gloves and more.

Ms Sanderson said she feels sick over the situation. As a single mom struggling to make ends meet with a disabled son, Christmas was a big enough hurdle to get over. She said she was depending on her Zellers points (HBC Rewards) to get Greg a present.

And then this happened.

Without the equipment, Greg can't play ice or ball hockey since, she said, she can't afford to replace it.

Sports, the mom said, are Greg's life. Every Saturday, he plays on the Special Hockey International league, which is made up of 50 teams across Canada.



"That's where his world is. That's where his confidence is."

The night the bag was stolen, Ms Sanderson said she cried. She walked down the street checking out all the garbage bins, but with no luck. When she told Greg what happened, he was broken-hearted, she said.

"He keeps saying, 'They're going to bring the bag home, right mom?" Ms Sanderson said.

What she wants this Christmas season is simple. "I'd like the bag back. I'd like to feel that there are good people out there, which I know there is."
