IceHawks impressive in shutout

Sharp cage work by Kleiman and gritty play allow Milton to blank host Oakville

The IceHawks offered another reminder of their championship potential in Oakville Friday night.

In a playoff-like clash with the Blades whom many believe are better than their record and mid-pack status in the Western Conference — Milton delivered a spirited and fundamentally-sound performance to prevail 2-0.

It was the first win for the IceHawks at Oakville's Twin Rinks Arena and their first shutout over the Blades in recent memory.

Zach Kleiman stopped all 21 shots for his second perfect game of the year, while Jason Bergeron and Ryan Bernardi scored on second and third-period rushes respectively to push the division front-runners' winning streak to 10 games.

That's a stark contrast to this time last year, when the IceHawks were in the midst of a mid-season tailspin that saw them limp into the playoffs on a five-game losing

However, the local juniors haven't been without adversity in recent weeks - with distraction from the loss of suspended head coach/general manager George Dupont and an accompanying rash of internet scuttlebutt — which makes Friday's win all the more encouraging.

"Zach played a great game and we executed well," said interim head coach Joe Washkurak. "We wanted it more than them (Blades) and this is a big win for our organization, especially with all that's been happening. We're really proud of the guys."

Milton persevered through some occasional rough play for what was arguably its biggest road win of the season and got assists from Jeff Aonso, Kevin Morrison and Matt Price - who represented the IceHawks at Wednesday's CJAHL Prospect's Game in Yorkton, Saskatchewan.

His Team East squad was trimmed 5-4 by the West.

Goals were also tough to come by in Brampton Thursday evening, when the IceHawks turned aside the host Capitals 3-- on the strength of two first-period goals by Brandon DeFazio and some steady cage work by back-up netminder Andrew Loverock.

After being a healthy scratch one game earlier against Burlington, DeFazio scored on near-identical upstairs wires four minutes apart to put Milton ahead. From there, Kole Bryce would connect on an odd-man rush late in the second and Milton would hang on with some solid positional play.

Thursday's game marked the first test against newly-acquired Brampton goalie Wyatt Russell, the 19-year-old son of big screen stars Kurt Russell and Goldie Hawn.

Now 26-2-1-1, the IceHawks will look to stay unbeaten at home Friday when they host the red-hot Hamilton Red Wings. Saturday they close out the week with a trip to Georgetown.

Strong turnout expected for alumni game

The IceHawks are also hoping to have another father-son combo in the form of Bert and Scott Bertoli, but that'll depend on Scott getting permission to play from his ECHL Trenton Titans.

Former Milton junior coach Bob (Pie) Lee will be behind the bench for one side, while the club is looking at having Bruce Hood officiate the game.

The alumni contest begins at 6 p.m. and all former players - whether they play or not - are welcome to stick around upstairs in the Lions Hall and take in the Milton-Oakville game afterwards.

In a high-tempo shootout two nights earlier at Milton Sports Centre, the Winterhawks trimmed Orangeville 7-6.



Important Information For 407 ETR Customers

Following a unanimous decision of the Ontario Divisional Court on November 7, 2005, the Ontario Registrar of Motor Vehicles has started to deny the renewal of existing and issuance of new plates of individuals who refuse to pay their 407 ETR bills.

Who Does This Affect?

Plate denial impacts those individuals who repeatedly refuse to pay their bills - not paying customers.

Most 407 ETR customers pay their bills on a regular basis and will not be affected by plate denial. Unfortunately, there are some people who use the highway and refuse to pay. That's unfair to paying customers and the company.

If you use 407 ETR and you have refused to pay your bills, your licence plates may not be renewed or issued unless you pay your outstanding balance.

Why Can Plates Be Denied?

Plate denial was a key part of the sale and exists because 407 ETR is an all-electronic, open-access highway.

To reduce congestion and improve traffic flow, the highway was designed by the Government without any toll booths or barriers. Unlike other companies which can cancel credit or cut service, 407 ETR cannot prevent someone who refuses to pay tolls from using the highway.

Plate denial was in place while the highway was government-owned and was a key part of the 1999 sale of the highway. Plate denial is also in place for people who refuse to pay parking tickets.

Are There Safeguards For Paying Customers?

Rigorous plate denial procedures minimize the chance of errors.

Individuals cannot have the renewal or issuance of a plate denied unless they have an outstanding balance for at least 125 days. 407 ETR must follow a detailed set of legislated rules, procedures and timelines.

What If I Have A Dispute?

You have the right to dispute a plate denial notice to an independent arbitrator.

As part of the plate denial process, you are given the opportunity to take a dispute to an independent arbitrator. The independent arbitrators are selected by the Ontario Government and the disputes will be resolved expeditiously.
