Large number of Carr's election signs removed

A slew of missing campaign signs has prompted Liberal candidate Gary Carr to propose the idea of doing away with them for good.

"I'm interested in seeing if other candidates are interested in getting rid of them all together," he said, adding he's also curious as to how the public would feel about the idea.

Stolen or missing signs is nothing new, Mr. Carr said, noting some disappeared in last year's federal election as well. But, he

said, it wasn't to this degree.

Within 24 hours of setting up Liberal campaign signs the first weekend in December, about 75 per cent of them were gone, Mr. Carr said, adding they hadn't simply been blown or knocked over.

"They were totally gone," he said. "None of the other candidates' were gone."

Areas that weren't well lit seem to have suffered the most, he said. He's asking the public to keep an eye out for anyone taking down Liberal

Mabel Martins, campaign manager for Mr. Carr, said she can't believe this is happening.

"This is absolutely disgusting that people would stoop so low and resort to such dirty tactics," she said.

Doing away with signs would take away the opportunity for theft, spare the community an eyesore and, in Burlington, may eliminate some extra costs, Mr. Carr said.

In Burlington, a bylaw was passed prohibiting election signs on public property, with the exception of Appleby and Guelph lines and Dundas Street, since they're regional and provincial roads.

When people violate the bylaw, it takes time and the public's money to have them taken down, Mr. Carr said.

Not putting up signs is something all four candidates would need to agree on, he added. But the incumbent may have a hard time convincing them of the benefits of his proposal.

While Conservative candidate Garth Turner said ultimately Mr. Carr's suggestion could be a good idea, he still sees the merit in having election signs.

"I think they play a role, particularly signs on private property," he said, noting it's a way for individuals to show who they support.

Mr. Turner said a large number of his campaign signs have also gone missing — or been damaged by the weather — but noted it's a fairly common problem in every election.

Halton NDP candidate Anwar Naqvi told The Champion he doesn't support the concept of doing away with the signs.

"How will we get out to the people if we don't put up signs?" he said, noting since Mr. Carr is the current MP he has exposure that the other parties don't.

Meanwhile, local Green Party candidate Dr. Kyle Grice said he has mixed feelings about the idea.

"In one way, it would be a strike against us. Some people don't even know of our existence," he said. "It's (signs) good for us in a sense that it gets our name out there."

On the other hand, he said the signs are a "waste of material." He pointed out that since a different candidate ran for the Green Party in Halton last year, they couldn't even recycle the signs this time around.

Both Dr. Grice and Mr. Naqvi said their parties haven't noticed many of their signs missing.
