Man trapped in machinery suffers serious leg injuries

Milton firefighters and Halton Emergency Medical Services worked as a team Friday to free a man trapped in machinery at a local manufacturing plant.

Milton Fire Department Chief Larry Brassard said firefighters responded to the Meritor plant at 150 Steeles Ave. just before noon after receiving a call that a man

was trapped in a conveyor belt.

Upon arrival, firefighters found that the 50-year-old employee had been doing maintenance work on the conveyor belt when he became entangled and was trapped by large steel rollers, Chief Brassard said.

"Firefighters stabilized the man, and then began working to cut the power to the conveyor belt," he said.

Halton EMS arrived and attended to the patient while firefighters worked for about an hour to disassemble and cut the conveyor belt apart to free the man.

The victim was transported to hospital with serious leg injuries.

The Ontario Ministry of Labour is investigating the incident.
