## Hawks edge Blades in OT

Late goals keep Milton unbeaten at Memorial



Alex Eaton perfectly execute a two-onone into the overtime winning goal at Memorial Arena Tuesday night, you would swear they had done this before.

It's the kind of play that a coach runs his players through at every

practice. So the fact that the two Milton IceHawks spent two years as linemates on the Ontario Hockey League's Sudbury Wolves meant they had probably practised that exact play hundreds of times.

And while the goal may have looked effortless, Tuesday's 3-2 comeback victory over the Oakville Blades was anything but — as Milton needed Jason Bergeron's goal with 21 seconds to play in regulation to force overtime. Then just 1:13 into the extra period, the former Wolves doused the biggest threat to Milton's team-record 22-game unbeaten streak.

"Dubbin broke away from the guy, it was a beautiful pass across," Eaton said. "It was definitely nice to put that one in."

While a player returning to Tier 2 Jr. A hockey from the OHL brings experience and skill, success is no guarantee. Chemistry often plays a role in whether a player succeeds in his new surroundings and reuniting the former linemates has obviously worked well. Eaton has produced three goals and eight points in four games since joining the IceHawks and Dubbin has four goals and eight points over the same span. Teamed with Dan Falbo, the line produced two of Milton's three goals on Tuesday.

"He's a pretty big pickup for us," said Milton interim head coach Joe Washkurak. "We felt we get pushed around a little bit and we needed to get some size. He's a tough kid and if anyone wants to take him on they're going to be in for a fight."

Milton almost had Eaton, who racked up 459 penalty minutes in 144 OHL games, in the lineup earlier this year. Sudbury put the six-foot-three winger on waivers and Milton gave him a call. However, the Barrie Colts claimed him. Despite scoring twice in eight games for the Colts, they too left him unprotected.
