Heart-breaking loss leaves Armstrong one win out of Scotts playoff picture

It was a roller-coaster week for Leigh Armstrong and her Chrissy Codorin-skipped rink in Thunder Bay.

Unfortunately, the ride ended a little earlier than the 23-year-old Miltonian would have preferred at the Scotts Tournament of Hearts Ontario Championships at the Fort Francis Curling Club.

Unable to sustain any momentum until the final day of roundrobin competition, Armstrong and company finished their rather erratic campaign at 5-4 — just one win shy of advancing to the weekend playdowns.

"It's disappointing. You get to this level and your goal is obviously to win. However, we didn't play horrible or anything. We'd just like to have had a few shots back," said the local curler, now a three-time competitor at the Scotts' Ontario championship.

For the most part, the results were far from dramatic for Armstrong's Guelph squad — which lost rounds one, three and five 8-0, 9-0 and 8-0 respectively and scored three lopsided victories of their own. The last of these came in the form of a 10-4 toppling of Nancy Wickham to cap a two-round sweep Thursday.

That would have been enough to crack the top four had Wednesday's 9-1 loss to Marilyn Bodogh gone the other way. While that round-seven defeat essentially took her team out of contention, Armstrong said a tournament-opening shutout at the hands of even-

tual champion Krista Scharf was especially tough to swallow - since it marked a rematch from last year's semifinals.

"That definitely hurt," she said.

From a personal standpoint, Armstrong felt fairly satisfied with her performance up north - particularly since she had to move up a spot to vice only a few short weeks ago to replace an otherwise committed Denna Schell.

"It takes a while to get use to this kind of change and start gelling again, but I think I did okay. Christy and I were communicating well in the house."

Armstrong will get another shot at a provincial championship in April, when her John Epping-led mixed rink — which captured national gold in Whitehorse, Yukon in November - vies for an Ontario repeat in Orangeville.
