Groundwork laid for convincing 1st-round sweep

If the Milton IceHawks were ever going to lose a game to the Mississauga. Chargers, Saturday was the one.

At first glance, the 52-point differential in the standings should make this series a monumental mismatch. However, the Chargers were one of only three teams to beat Milton in the regular season and kept things respectable with the conference frontrunners all year — with their widest margin of defeat only three goals.
