# Traffic safety upgrades proposed for roads

A slew of traffic safety improvements have been proposed for Town

The potential changes — like lowering the speed limit by 10 km/h in certain rural areas and improving pavement markings in school crossing zones - were outlined at the community services committee meeting Monday evening by iTrans Consulting, which recently completed a traffic engineering practices study for the Town.

### Champion up for awards

Overall, Metroland's Halton Division - which includes The Champion, as well as sister papers Oakville Beaver and Burlington Post - garnered 15 OCNA nominations. That means they're in the top 3 of all entries among community newspapers in Ontario.

The winners will be announced at an awards banquet April 1.

The study presents recommended alterations to the Town's existing policies when it comes to things like allway stop warrants and rural and urban traffic engineering practices.

These suggested changes, which the committee supported, include:

 Installing 40 km/h speed limits along all elementary school frontages

 Painting two sets of parallel lines at designated supervised school crossings, in addition to painting large blocks on either side of the crossing.

· Reducing the speed limit by 10 km/h on Town rural roads within 1.5 kilometres of a parallel regional road with a lower posted speed limit, and where demonstrated 'cut-through traffic' (commuters) is measured

· Painting centre lines on all rural roads that are at least six metres wide and edge lines on horizontal and vertical curves and in areas susceptible to
