Wiarton Willie logo and book created locally

Logo recently used to help celebrate 50th anniversary of Wiarton's Groundhog Festival

Wiarton Willie, David Haley wrote a book (in 1999) and designed a logo about the weather-predicting rodent.

Haley, a Brittania Road resident, said the logo was used to commemorate the recent 50th Anniversary of Wiarton's Groundhog Festival and to raise money for the Wiarton Legion.

The logo was originally drawn by Haley in 2000 after he completed his book, 'The Life and Legend of Wiarton Willie'. The picture, depicting Willie in a meadow, sat for years, with Haley unsure of what he'd like to use it for. An advertisement at the beginning of January about the 50th anniversary prompted him to finally put the logo to use.

"The logo had been sitting in my house since January 2000," said Haley. "When I noticed the anniversary flyer, I pulled the logo out and called the Town of Wiarton to see if we could use it and they agreed."

Haley took the design to a friend who enhanced the image on her computer by adding a brilliant rainbow and titles for the '50th Anniversary' and 'The Legend'.

Willie a Canadian icon


"Willie is (the) Canadian icon that everyone associates with Wiarton's mid-winter festival. Because of this universal recognition, Willie is referred to simply as 'The Legend' (on the logo)," said Haley.

The logo was emblazoned on numerous items by the Village Gallery and Graphics in Waterdown, including sweatshirts, t-shirts, hats, and headbands, all being sold by order through Haley, at the Wiarton Groundhog Festival, and at Spice O' Life in Milton.

Haley had received orders for more than \$7,000 in merchandise before the festival even began.

The logo has also been adopted by the Wiarton Legion to help raise money for a new mural to be painted on the side of a building in Wiarton to commemorate the Year of the Veteran. The cost of the mural is \$8,400, said Haley, and the Legion has raised over a quarter of that amount already with the logo.

Haley grew up in Flamborough and often 'hunted' groundhogs as a child. With his father as the official Wiarton Willie archivist, he has been privy to a great deal of information about the rodent for years, helping him immeasurably when writing his book. 'The Life and Legend of Wiarton

Willie', primarily written for children, is a biography of Wiarton Willie's life, his ability to predict the weather, and how Wiarton's mid-winter festival became dedicated to him. Although the timeline is slightly stretched to incorporate some of the town of Wiarton's interesting details, the story is very factual and all the characters are real, said Haley.

"This is a historical novel wove around actual events and people, with fun brought in and adjusted for interest. It is very authentic," said Haley.

Haley said he has sold about 1,200 copies of the 'Life and Legend of Wiarton Willie' since being published, but admits that sales tend to be centered around Groundhog Day and Wiarton's Groundhog Festival.
