
## **Brothers co-named 2005 Citizen of the Year**

When Mark and Greg Ollerenshaw organized a softball tournament a decade ago to help a friend, both teens thought it was a one-time deal.

Neither brother had any idea it would continue year after year, raising money for cause after cause.


Last year, the Leslie Wells Slo-Pitch Tournament celebrated its 10th anniversary and in total, the event has raised more than \$130,000.

So it's no surprise the brothers have been selected to share the title of Citizen of the Year for the Milton Chamber of Commerce's 2005 Community Awards.

The Ollerenshaws, the youngest ever recipients of the award, will be honoured at a black tie gala April 8 at Granite Ridge Golf Club on Dublin Line. Tickets cost \$75.

"I think it's great that younger people are being recognized for doing this kind of work," said Mark, 30, adding he hopes it'll encourage other young people to get involved in their community.

Mark and Greg organized the first slo-pitch tournament in 1996 when they were 19 and 17 respectively, to raise money for Leslie Wells - a Miltonian who was involved in an accident that left her paralyzed - and also for spinal cord injury research.

The next year, funds raised from the second tournament were given to another local person who suffered a spinal cord injury.
