Ellison gearing up for Royal Bank Cup

Despite longshot status, host Derbys shouldn't be counted out, says local winger


teve Ellison has never been one to put too much stock in what the so-called hockey experts have to say, and perhaps that's just as well.

If he did, the 20-year-old Miltonian would likely be looking upon next month's Royal Bank Cup (RBC) with dread rather than as the once-in-a-lifetime opportunity that it is.

Part of the team that'll host the Tier 2 Jr. A nationals at the Brampton Poweraid Centre May 6 to 14, Ellison and his Streetsville Derbys are being given practically no chance for victory - at least according to talk at local arenas and recent postings on a popular Internet forum. To hear some fans tell, the Derbys hosts won't just fall short of a national title, but will fall embarrassingly short.

At one point there was even some speculation that Streetsville would find itself with a severely depleted lineup by the time the RBC rolled some players to simply jump ship.

"I don't know where that came from — everyone here knows what's in front of us and what a big opportunity this is," said the third-year right winger, whose RBC hosts are now in the late stages of a two-and-a-half month hiatus before the nationals having been eliminated in first-round Provincial Jr. A playoff action by Georgetown February 21. "Basically

we're just trying to ignore the critics and stay focused."

Ellison need only look back to last spring to throw a giant-size monkey wrench into the naysayers' no-chancein-hell-for-Streetsville outlook. Much like this year's Derbys, the 2005 RBC host Weyburn Red Wing sat around for two months after being put out in the round one — but brought it all together once the country's top teams hit Saskatchewan.

"Anything can happen at this level, I think the Milton IceHawks going out in the second round proves that," said around, with a lengthy layoff causing Ellison, referring to his hometown club's shockingly-early departure from the playoffs. "Anybody can beat anybody. Sure we're not the most talented team out there and we've taken some bumps this season, but if everyone brings 100 per cent, we've got no doubt that we can compete."

That optimism stems partly from personal experience, since the former Halton Hurricane is no stranger to see BREAK on page A20
