Commission for a reason.

"I am sure Milton has plenty of land already designated for building and expansion without this," he said.

Main Street West resident Colin Best raised a variety of concerns about the development plans, such as the possible impact a train derailment could have on the homes, since they'd be located near train tracks.

He said he thinks a derailment "would wipe out some townhouses."

But Ward 4 Councillor John Challinor disputed Best. "Nobody in the community has ever been at risk because of the railway."

Ward 3 Councillor Cindy Lunau asked Best what he thought the ideal use for the land would be, to which he responded that the town has a dire need for cemetery space.

Councillors at the committee meeting went on to express a

mix of views on the topic.

Ward 4 Councillor Wendy Schau said she's not in favour of the staff recommendation to support the concept plan, noting she feels there's already enough land in the Town's designated urban boundaries to build homes on. "We have an opportunity to protect green-space. We should protect it."

Lunau said she supports "some sort of development" on the property, explaining that rehabilitation of the site is desperately needed. "We do need this housing form and lot size to complete a true housing mix. We don't want to be a one-house town."

Meanwhile, Challinor deemed the 298 homes proposed as "too high."

"I'm not happy with this number," he said.

He also noted he doesn't want another level of government determining how the community is going to develop.

But, Challinor also had

something positive to say about the subdivision, explaining he thinks the larger lot sizes that've been proposed are quite appropriate for that side of the community.

He also said that to think there'll never be development on the land is naive.

Wards 1 and 3 Councillor Barry Lee said while the Town may not get much of what it wants in the development from the board, he pointed out if the Town doesn't go to the hearing it'll get nothing that it's looking for. "I think it would be wrong not to support this and be absent."

In the end, the committee deferred the matter so that staff can negotiate the concept plan further with the developer.

The Central Milton Holdings joint board hearing is scheduled to resume July 4 at 10 a.m. in Milton Council Chambers.
