On December 23, 2005, my brother Brian, here from Vancouver with his wife and children for our family's Christmas, suffered a fatal heart attack.

We're writing to thank the numerous emergency service personnel who did everything they could to save his life.

From the 911 operator who immediately dispatched an ambulance, to the two paramedic/ambulance personnel who were at the house within four minutes, to the five firemen who arrived shortly thereafter to assist, to the police officers who stopped traffic so the ambulance could make a faster trip to the hospital, to the emergency room doctors, nurses and staff at Milton District Hospital, all worked in an extremely professional and compassionate manner.

Our thanks as well to the volunteer councillor from the Halton Police Victim Services Unit who met with us at the hospital and came to our house to work with the children and family in trying to cope with this unexpected loss.

On Christmas Eve, one day after this devastating event, our family was moved by the arrival of members of the Milton Fire Department, who came to our home with stuffed toys for the children, a soft afghan and food and to speak to Brian's young son. Words can't possibly express how extremely grateful and thankful we are.

On behalf of my family, I want to extend our gratitude to the exceptional men and women who serve our community as emergency services personnel. We have experienced first hand their skill and professionalism, as well as the incredible humanity and compassion they bring to their work.
