
Ellison's Derbys edged in Royal Bank Cup semis

t was a dog-fight rematch for championship advancement, and unfortunately for Steve Ellison his Royal Bank Cup hosts didn't quite have enough bite.

The 20-year-old Milton winger and the Streetsville Derbys gave up two early goals to Saskatchewan's Yorkton Terriers and just couldn't erase that deficit at the Brampton Powerade Centre Saturday night losing their national semifinal clash 2-1.

The fact that they beat Yorkton by an identical score four days earlier and finished first in roundrobin play at 3-1 no doubt made the narrow defeat that much more heartbreaking.

Ellison, shortly after the Derbys' hopes for a Tier 2 Jr. A Canadian title officially came to an end in front of a disappointingly-small crowd at the Battalion barn. "We gave it our all, but we had a couple of bad bounces and came up short."

Streetsville had their prairie rivals on their heels for much of the last two periods - after killing off a two-man advantage and cutting the lead in half on an upstairs rebound deposit by former Milton IceHawk Ryan Silveira.

But two goals inside the first five minutes — both by reliable sniper Chris Korchinski — and some steady cage work by Brett Bothwell would be enough to put Yorkton in Sunday's final.

A diminutive second-year Derby, Ellison had a small but spirited fan base last week, including one especially vocal follower with an #86 painted on his chest. "Yeah that's just a good buddy looking to getting the crowd going," he said.

The local RBC participant finished the national tournament with two points — a goal against Yorkton last Tuesday and assist in a 4-1 loss to C.R. Joliette Wednesday night.

Yorkton would go on to get hammered 8-2 by B.C.'s Burnaby Express in the RBC championship Sunday night.
