





### VON Halton now offers Tele-Touch

A comforting voice is just a phone call away now for seniors and individuals with disabilities through VON Halton's Tele-Touch service.

The initiative a telephone reassur-

The initiative, a telephone reassurance service, involves specially-trained volunteers making regular phone calls to seniors and those with disabilities who live alone to offer friendly conversation, security and reassurance.

"Tele-Touch complements our existing volunteer visiting services, which reach out to socially isolated seniors and individuals with physical limitations," said Anne King, VON Halton manager of volunteer services. "It will allow us to expand our reach and respond more effectively to the increasing need for these services to better serve our community."

Clients can refer themselves or be referred by family members, physicians and other community agencies.

VON Volunteer Services says efforts will be made to recruit volunteers with specific linguistic skills to accommodate clients of diversified backgrounds.
