You could be selected for health department's well water survey

The Region will conduct a well water quality survey over the next three months.

Health department staff will randomly select and visit 300 Halton residents who draw their water from private wells and request that they participate in the survey.

Those who take part will be asked to answer a few brief questions and provide a sample of their well water for nitrate and bacteria level testing.

In addition to collecting water samples, health department staff will assess the location and construction of the private well and provide specific recommendations for

improvement, as required.

Conducting the survey provides the Region with an opportunity to share information with residents about maintaining their private wells and the importance of having their well water tested regularly.

The survey will be conducted in two phases — spring and summer — to allow comparisons.

"Previous surveys conducted in the years 1993 and 2000 found that water from a considerable number of wells in Halton did not meet the standards for drinking water safety," said Dr. Bob Nosal, Halton's medical officer of health.

"Our efforts remain focused on encouraging regular testing and proper well construction and maintenance."

Results of the 2006 survey will also be compared against those from previous surveys to determine if there've been any changes in well water quality.

Through the health department, residents can have samples of their well water tested for bacteria at no cost. Samples can be dropped off at depots located throughout Halton.
