## Proposed housing strategy praised DateLine

the Allendale campus in Milton.

Before endorsing the strategy, the committee first heard from a few local residents on the matter.

Habitat for Humanity Halton (HfHH) Executive Director Kathrin Delutis said the organization thinks the strategy needs to include a home ownership component.

"We believe that the Region should, in partnership with Habitat for Humanity Halton, support the provision of housing across the housing continuum, including home ownership," she said.

The strategy does recommend that the Region should



"investigate the potential for the creation of an affordable home ownership program delivered by Halton Region."

Delutis also asked that, in finalizing the strategy, the Region waive its various development fees for Habitat.

"By lowering the cost to build our homes we are able to pass these savings on to the home owner," she said. "Habitat's ability to provide home ownership to low-income individuals and families will assist in lowering the number of individuals on the waiting list for affordable housing, allowing us to assist you in delivering the comprehensive housing strat-

Representatives from the Halton Housing Advisory Committee (HHAC) also spoke at the session and praised the strategy, dubbing it a "seminal report."

"This is a leading-edge initiative which underscores the Region's leadership in continuing to promote healthier communities in Halton," said HHAC's Lang Moffat. "We really feel very strongly that it's a step forward in this whole area."

Regional Chairman Joyce Savoline went on to sing the strategy's praises as well.

"It is truly as much a made-in-Halton solution as a model for other communities to follow," she said.

Halton Hills Councillor Clark Somerville said now, the Region has got to make sure the plan is "something that doesn't gather dust."

"We have to keep pushing it from here," he said.

Burlington Councillor Joan Lougheed said the document is a "cause for celebration."

"I think this first step is a really important step," she said. Commissioner of Social and Community Services Adelina Urbanski noted that creating the strategy was truly a labour of love. She gave special thanks to her staff, who she said gave up their vacations and weekends to work on the document.

The housing strategy will go before regional council tomorrow for final approval.


