This housing mix would allow first time buyers, such as our grown children, to move back to our community upon completion of their education. This housing mix would allow empty nesters the ability to downsize but stay in Halton. We need a mix of housing - both public and private - to meet a mix of needs.

Halton Regional Council

identified the creation of a housing strategy as an important goal in its 2004-2006 Strategic Plan and struck a Steering Committee to address the issue. The result, following a year of consultations with the community and stakeholders, extensive research and dialogue, was a Comprehensive Housing Strategy that identifies a range of housing types for all incomes and all stages of life. This includes emergency shelters and government assisted housing to a range of private sector affordable housing. Halton's Comprehensive Housing Strategy will guide our efforts towards establishing housing that meets the diverse needs of our community.

The success of the CHS and the vision it lays out will depend on continued support from all orders of government, as well as the understanding and support of Halton residents, business leaders and housing partners. 

Maintaining a Healthy Community

An investment in housing is an investment in maintaining a healthy community across Halton. We all understand that when people are well-housed, it helps them to live more stable lives. This often reduces their need for other human services and when housing is liveable and "visit-able" for those with physical

limitations, it supports independent living. These are some of the principles we needed to consider in the development of a Comprehensive Housing Strategy for Halton. To ensure Halton remains a healthy, vibrant community in which to work and live, we need a housing market that provides choices for all residents.

A broad range of housing alternatives provides substantial benefits to the community. A mix of density and affordability can support viable public transportation which leads to better air quality and physical health. A supply of varied housing options is also part of ensuring a competitive economic environment as businesses look at housing options for their employees when they consider expanding or locating in Halton.

There is no question that housing is important for the overall health of a community. That is why a committee consisting of Halton elected

officials and staff consulted with stakeholders and residents within the community to look at critical housing gaps. The Comprehensive Housing Strategy was established and five major strategic directions and strategies, along with a set of 21 short-term and 18 long-term priorities with specific recommendations for action, was developed.

The next step will be to create a detailed work plan to implement the CHS. There is much work to be done, but the Comprehensive Housing Strategy has provided us with clear direction to guide us as we move forward.
