

## Amemorable day for lonadi

Celebrates birth of daughter and Italy's World Cup victory

s Milton's Phil Ionadi was making last-minute preparations for a World Cup party, friend Peter L Koutoulas turned to him and said, "Wouldn't it be cruel if Shannon (Ionadi's wife) went into labour during the final."

"Don't jinx me like that," Ionadi shot back.

"And what if it went to penalty kicks and you couldn't watch," Koutoulas suggested, as he continued to needle his fellow soccer enthusiast.

"You're terrible. Why would you say something like that?" replied Ionadi.

Less than 24 hours later, that scenario played itself out Phil lonadi and new baby girl exactly as it had been jokingly Michela Rose described, when Shannon

delivered Michela Rose — the couple's first child — at 4:35

p.m. — less than a minute before Fabio Grosso delivered the goal that clinched the World Cup for Italy. "It's a day I'll never forget," said Ionadi, coach of the

neighbouring Oakville Blue Devils of the Canadian Professional Soccer League. "It wasn't even 30 seconds after the baby was born that the nurse came in and said, 'Italy won the World Cup'."

And the Azzurri fan base quickly grew by one, as a tiny Italian jersey was slipped on to Michela. Although at the beginning of the day, dreams of an Italian victory were at the top of Ionadi's mind, the big game quickly became secondary.

"Life changes very quickly," he said.

Shannon went into labour that morning. So as the World Cup final kicked off, the Ionadis were at Milton District Hospital anxiously awaiting their new arrival.

Although at one point Shannon gave her husband permission to check the television down the hall, there was no decision to be made as to where he'd be for the delivery.

"It's your first child. It's once in a lifetime," Ionadi said. "Hopefully Italy will be back in the final for the next World Cup. They'll have to win one for me. They owe me one."
